WELCOME!

If you are new to Pack 68, welcome to our Pack! If you are a returning member, welcome back for another year of scouting fun and adventure! Here's hoping the information and guidelines presented to you in the next few pages will help you get off to a great start for the coming year.

To begin with, your youth is a member of Cub Scout <u>Pack 68</u>, the oldest pack in Lakewood! Our Pack is part of the Western Trails District in the Lake Erie Council. Pack 68 is made up of six <u>Dens</u>; Lions (Kindergarten), Tigers (1st grade), Wolves (2nd grade), Bears (3rd grade), Webelos I (4th grade) and Webelos II (5th grade). Collectively we are Cub Scouts and are members of the national organization, the Boy Scouts of America (BSA).

All Packs have a Chartered Organization as a 'sponsor', and ours is <u>The Lakewood United Methodist Church</u> located at 15700 Detroit Avenue in Lakewood. This is where a majority of our Den & Pack meetings are held.

The Pack is run by volunteer adult leaders who make up the <u>Pack Committee</u>, which includes a Committee Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, Cubmaster, Assistant Cubmaster, Den Leaders, Assistant Den Leaders, among others. All parents and guardians of a Scout in Pack 68 are welcome and encouraged to become a Committee Member. Our <u>Committee Meetings</u> are usually held on the first Thursday of each month at 7 pm and are open to ALL parents and guardians.

Den Meetings are usually held the first two Tuesdays of each month at 7:00 pm and provide an opportunity for Scouts to work with their individual Dens on projects, achievements and skills appropriate for each grade and age level.

Pack Meetings are usually held the third Tuesday of each month at 6:30 pm and allow the entire Pack to come together for special events, awards, and recognitions.

Family Fun Nights are usually held the last Tuesday of each month at 7:00 pm. These evenings are not based on earning Pack or Den achievements or awards but instead are meant as social events for the entire group.

WHY JOIN CUB SCOUTING?

Your family time is valuable. More than ever, today's families can struggle to find time to spend together. Cub Scouting helps to support your family by providing ready-made opportunities for you and your youth to do things together. Unlike most other academic and extracurricular activities where adults are usually on the sidelines cheering, Cub Scouting provides a unique opportunity for fun and exciting parent/guardian and child interaction.

Youth need to belong to a group their own age. Through this sense of belonging, children build self-esteem and learn to get along with others. As a parent or guardian, you want to be assured that the groups that your youth joins will teach values consistent with good citizenship, character development, and physical fitness. The Boy Scouts of America has been weaving these lifetime values into fun and educational activities since 1910.

<u>Scouting or sports – or both?</u> The result of research addressing the age-old question of whether kids get more out of Scouting or sports may surprise you. Findings show that a young person's best bet might be participating in both! If you find that sports or other seasonal activities have a time conflict with Scouting events, just participate as often as you can, even if that means showing up in a soccer uniform. Plan to get back into the swing of things as soon as you can, and our leaders will be happy to help you catch up with the rest of the Den.

<u>Scouting builds leaders and shapes character in its members</u>. Additional research programs conclude that boys in Cub Scouts experience significant increases in cheerfulness, helpfulness, kindness, obedience, trustworthiness and hopeful future expectations when compared with non-Scouts. Further, when asked what was most important to them, Scouts were significantly more likely than non-Scouts to choose "helping others" or "doing the right thing" over "being the best" or "playing sports".



Scouting is FUN! When it comes down to it, kids join Cub Scouting because they want to have fun. But fun encompasses a lot more than just having a good time. It comes from the satisfaction of meeting challenges, making new friends, feeling good about oneself, and feeling important to other people. Cub Scouting allows youth to have fun doing activities they like to do, all while learning new things, mastering new skills, gaining self-confidence, and developing strong friendships.



CUB SCOUT RANKS

For those who are new to Scouting as well as those who need a quick refresher, the different ranks of the Cub Scout experience are:

Bobcats – All new Cub Scouts regardless of when they join the program must earn the rank of Bobcat first. The exception is the Lion Scouts who do not need to earn the Bobcat badge. By earning their Bobcat badge, the scouts will know the signs, symbols, and big ideas of Scouting, including the Scout Oath, the Scout Law, the Cub Scout sign, the Cub Scout handshake, the Cub Scout motto, and the Cub Scout salute.

Lions – Youth in kindergarten or are 5 years old.

Tigers – Youth in the first grade or are 6 years old.

Wolves – Youth in the second grade or are 7 years old.

Bears – Youth in the third grade or are 8 years old.

Webelos I – Youth in the fourth grade or are 9 years old.

Webelos II – Youth in the fifth grade or are 10 years old

Arrow of Light – The highest rank a Cub Scout can achieve. A high level of dedication is required to fulfill the requirements for this honor.

There are Scout Handbooks for each rank (Lion, Tiger, Wolf, Bear and Webelos) which the Pack will purchase and provide for you. The handbooks contain information about the various achievements and activities for each rank. Each Cub Scout should have their own handbook. Each parent and guardian is encouraged to familiarize themselves with the handbook.

The Cub Scout program is an excellent way for you to spend quality time with your family. The responsibility of a scout's advancement in Cub Scouting lies with the family and not just with the pack. Most advancement requirements are done at den meetings, but some are done at home with the family. For each special skill or activity your youth completes with you, you can sign off on one of the requirements they need to earn their next award. As a result, the awards they earn increase their knowledge, skills, self-esteem, and confidence.







Pack 68 sponsors a family-oriented Pack activity almost every month promoting fun, service, and character building at no extra cost. Below is a list of some of our traditional activities:



FUNDRAISING

Pack 68 is able to sponsor so amazing events, awards, and programming throughout the year at little to no extra cost to our Scouts because of our fundraising efforts. Our goal is to put the "fun" in each of our fundraising events.



Our main fundraiser is the annual District Popcorn sales event which takes place mid-September through the end of November. Over 40% of all sales goes directly to our Pack with an additional 20% going to the Lake Erie Council. Each Cub Scout is greatly encouraged to sell a minimum of \$300 worth of popcorn.

As an alternative, if you choose not to have your Cub Scout sell popcorn, you can make a payment to the Pack in the amount of \$125 (the amount equivalent to what the Pack would receive for \$300 popcorn sales).

More information about products available for sale, "show and sell" opportunities, on-line sales, and prizes will be forthcoming.

In addition, we also host two fundraiser meals at Lakewood United Methodist Church; a spaghetti dinner and a pancake breakfast. Another popular event is selling cotton candy during the Meet the Trucks event at Lakewood Park in June.

ADULT INVOLVEMENT: THE KEY TO YOUR SCOUT'S SUCCESS

One of the most critical elements of a successful Scouting experience is family involvement. It is proven that scouts whose parents and guardians actively support their activities in Scouting and that get involved perform better. You can make a **HUGE** difference in your youth's Scouting experience when you:

GUIDE YOUR CUB SCOUT: Help them to understand and accomplish the achievements required for each rank. Show interest in and appreciation for their accomplishments and the new things they are learning. Be sure to keep accurate record of their achievements in their Handbook.

PLEASE BE SURE YOUR CUB SCOUT GETS TO EACH DEN AND PACK MEETING ON TIME: Arriving a few minutes early will give you time to sign up for events, chat with friends, check in with your Den Leader about upcoming events, etc. since meetings need to begin on time. Also be sure your Scout is looking sharp in their proper uniform and brings their Handbook to each meeting.

SUPPORT YOUR DEN LEADER AND CUBMASTER: Take the initiative to ask how you can help the Pack throughout the year. Also consider volunteering for a leadership position yourself. Remember that EVERY leader was once a new leader and many training opportunities are available.

HELP TACKLE THE "BIG LIST OF LITTLE THINGS" - In order to successfully carry out the wide variety of activities throughout the year, we need help from EVERY Pack family. Volunteering takes many forms, you can help by:

- Organizing food for a potluck event
- · Decorating for an event
- Designing the Class B T-shirt
- Coordinating a service project

YOUTH PROTECTION



Youth safety is of paramount importance to Scouting. As part of the Boy Scouts of America, we adhere to the official *Guide to Safe Scouting* regulations that provide direction in maintaining a safe Scouting experience for a broad range of Scouting activities. The guideline that has the most noticeable impact on the Cub Scout level is that of two-deep leadership. Youth protection guidelines require that all group activities involving Cub Scouts maintain the presence of at least two adult leaders. Please be prepared to say "YES" when your Cub Scout's Den Leader asks your assistance in helping to serve as a second leader.

Youth Protection training is required for all BSA registered volunteers. Parents are also strongly encouraged to take Youth Protection training to become familiar with policies, procedures, and guidelines.
